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# Why Learn about Color and Color Vision in a Physics Class?

"There are many interesting phenomena associated with vision which involve a mixture of physical phenomena and physiological processes, and the full appreciation of natural phenomena, as we see them, must go beyond physics in the usual sense. We make no apologies for making these excursions into other fields, because the separation of fields, as we have emphasized, is merely a human convenience, and an unnatural thing. ## Why study color?

- Most interesting new physics and technology is multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary
  - Color is a model system
- Note the variety of models and methods we will use to explore color



### Color: An Ideal System for Using and Understanding Models

- Wide Variety of Different Color Models: inter-related
  - Color math
    - addition/subtraction/algebra/multiplication/fractions
  - RBG color space color monitors
  - CMY color space color printing
  - L\*a\*b\* color space most common in technologycolor distance
  - CIE xyY chromaticity diagram color science
  - Color wheel art-but artists color wheel is incorrect
  - Color cube both RGB and CMY
- Models relate theory and experiment; predict or explain



Color: a Physics Topic for Everyone

- Good physics
- Relevant to most students
- Enrich a student's life
- Reinforced on a frequent basis in a typical student's life
- Impact the student a year from now

- Primary colors are R, G, B
- Primary colors are C, M, Y
- Colors in rainbow: ROY G. BIV
- Increasing temperature: ROYWB



## How we see color

Basic simplifying assumption:

The color we see results from light of that color entering our eye.



# White Light Experiment

- Place C film over color wheel on W paper
  - C film absorbs what color of light?
- Place M film over color wheel on W paper
   M film absorbs what color of light?
- Place Y film over color wheel on W paper
  Y film absorbs what color of light?
- Place C, M, Y films on top of each other What happens? What does this mean?
  - What happens? What does this mean?



# White Light Experiment

• Place C film over color wheel on W paper

– C film absorbs R light (W-R=C)

- Place M film over color wheel on W paper
   M film absorbs G light (W-G=M)
- Place Y film over color wheel on W paper

– Y film absorbs B light (W-B=Y)

- Place C, M, Y films on top of each other
  - White light is completely absorbed by the R light absorber, G light absorber, and B light absorber
  - So white light: W=R+G+B

(Letters refer to color of light)



# Use Color Math to Determine Rules for Additive Color Mixing

- We determined that: W = R + G + B
- Therefore:
  - R + G = W B = Y
    - Blue absorber appears yellow in white light
  - G + B = W R = C
    - Red absorber appears cyan in white light
  - B + R = W G = M
    - Green absorber appears magenta in white light
- Use these relations to generate a color wheel



## Color Wheel Model for Additive Colors (Light)



# Complementary Colors of Light

- Overlapping complementary colors of light produce white
- Use color math to show this:
  - -C, R : C+R = B+G+R = W
  - -M, G: M+G = R+B+G = W
  - Y, B: Y+B = R+G+B = W
- Complementary colors lie on opposite sides of the color wheel



# Primary colors of light

- Combining the 3 primary colors of light produces the largest range of colors of light compared to any 3 other colors.
- We showed that combining R, G, B light produced the distinctly different C, M, and Y light colors.
- It is an experimental fact that red, green, and blue light sources yields the largest range of colors of light.
- So red, green, and blue are the primary colors of light.









### Other Ways to Explore Additive Color Mixing (Mixing Colors of Light)

- 3 slide projectors: R, G, B (typical)
- 2 slide projectors better!
  - RG, GB, BR, then RC, GM, BY
- Observe colors on monitor with 8x magnifier (try)
- RGB LED light mixer
- Simulation using RGB model (demonstrate)
- Simulation using RGB model web applet
- Use color wheel and transparencies (done)

#### To generate colors, starting with white light

- Printers, painters need to generate colors starting with white light -room light, day light
- You need a red light absorber, a green light absorber, and a blue light absorber, at percentages ranging from 0 to 100%
- What color will these light absorbers appear in white light?



To generate colors, starting with white light

- A red light absorber absorbs red light, so it appears cyan in white light: W-R=G+B
- Note that it would appear green in green light or yellow light and blue in blue light or magenta light. So the only true statement we can make about it is that it is a red light absorber we cannot truly describe it by its apparent color.





To generate colors, starting with white light

• A green light absorber absorbs green light, so it appears magenta in white light (W-G=R+B)



• A blue light absorber absorbs blue light, so it appears yellow in white light (W-B=R+G)



What colors should printers use to generate a wide range of colors?

- We want to be able to generate 0-100% of combinations of red, green and blue light
- Need:
  - Red absorber cyan ink
  - Green absorber magenta ink
  - Blue absorber yellow ink
- Need to be able to print inks at coverages ranging from 0-100%



## How could printers generate R, G, B using C, M, Y inks?

• Use films to verify your predictions.



## Generate RGB light using CMY inks in white light

- Overlap M and Y transparencies on W paper
   Red (M film absorbs G light, Y film absorbs B light)
- Overlap Y and C transparencies on W paper
   Green (Y film absorbs B light, C film absorbs R light)
- Overlap C and M transparencies on W paper
  - Blue (C film absorbs R light, M film absorbs G light)



### Color Wheel Model for Subtractive Colors (Pigments)

Color wheel for light and pigments is the same!



## Complementary Colors of Pigment

- Overlapping complementary colors of pigment produce black
- Use color math to show this:
  - R, C pigments: W-R-G-B = K
  - G,M pigments: W-G-R-B = K
  - B,Y pigments: W-B-R-G = K
- Complementary colors lie on opposite sides of the color wheel
- Demonstration using complementary color films, 2 color wheels
- Demonstration using interference filters



# How could printers generate 0-100% R, G, B using C, M, Y inks?

- Dilute each ink for each colored area
- Have extremely dilute inks and use multiple passes to achieve desired color
- Print very small areas with different area coverage so that your eye blends the areas with ink and the areas without the ink



## Use of Gradient Strips

- How are colors besides CMYRGBK produced?
- Experiment with CMYK strips
- Try to match a color on your magazine page.

- Then compare how the gradient strip produced the color to how the color was actually produced observe using your hand-held microscope.

Applications of Subtractive Color Mixing

- Color Printing
  - Use hand-held microscope
  - Find examples of CMY strips on cereal boxes, magazines, ...
- Color of water (see Light Matters poster)
  - Glass of water
  - Pool or ocean
- Color of grass (see Light Matters poster)
- Energy conservation color of clothes

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### Ways to Explore Subtractive Color Mixing (Pigments: Ink or Paint)

- Colored (absorbing) transparencies
- Interference filters
- Paint
- Colored water
- Shine laser light through films
  - Bonus: Diffraction pattern due to dot printing pattern
- RGB LED light mixer
- Simulation using CMY model in Word
- Simulation using CMY model- web applet
- Zip lock bags



# Recent example of change from subtractive to additive color

- Traffic lights
  - Old style: white light source, green cover
  - New style: green light emitting diodes
- Why the change?
  - Light emitting diodes are more efficient
    - Much energy lost to green cover (R, B absorbed)
  - Multiple light sources 100 LEDs
    - If one burns out, the signal still operates
  - LEDs have longer lifetime lower maintenance costs
- White LEDs for lighting is focus of much R+D



## What about the artist's primary colors? Red, Yellow, Blue

- Overlap R and Y transparencies on W paper – Resultant color?
- Overlap R and B transparencies on W paper – Resultant color?
- Overlap Y and B transparencies on W paper
  - Resultant color?



## R, Y, B Primaries

- Overlap R and Y transparencies on W paper
  - Red
- Overlap R and B transparencies on W paper
   Black
- Overlap Y and B transparencies on W paper
  - Black
  - R, Y, B are not appropriate primaries

Traditional artist's color wheel is incorrect

Exercise for the interested teacher: Use bar graph model to theoretically demonstrate why RYB fail as primaries.



# Other Simple Color Models

- Color cube
  - Sold as a model for C, M, Y subtractive color mixing
  - Also a model for R, G, B additive color mixing
  - Note that color cube is a more complete model than the color wheel
  - Distance between color coordinates quantifies color differences



## Theory of Color Vision and Implications

- Red (R), Green (G), and Blue (B) cones
  - R(L-long wavelength), G(M-mid wavelength), B(S-short wavelength)
- 3 cone responses are processed to become 3 color receptive responses
  - R+G yields brightness and perception of yellow
  - R-G yields red or green response
  - (R+G)-B = Y-B yields yellow or blue response



## Theory of Color Vision and Implications

- Implications:
  - We see 4 distinct colors: R, G, Y, B basis for L\*a\*b\* color space
  - We do not see reddish greens or yellowish blues
  - The blue cone does not contribute to brightness so images that only differ in brightness of blue are difficult to see. This is why blue is hard to see at night and why blue on black is a terrible choice for web pages. See example of colors printed at different lightnesses.

## **Conclusion-Color Clarification**

- Combinations of R, G, and B light produce largest variation of colored light compared to any other 3 colors of light
- Primary colors of pigment are C, M, Y
- Need to always specify if we mean
  - color of light
  - color of an object as seen in white light (absorbs colors of light)
- Colors in nature can be understood using rules of color mixing
